Read: Matthew 19:27; Mark 10:28; Luke 5:11; Luke 5:28

Who has been called to follow Jesus today?



Read: 1 Peter 2:21; Mark 8:34-38; Luke 3:6; Acts 17:30

The Bible makes it clear that Jesus came, not only to restore Israel's relationship with God, but to remove the barriers between all of humankind and God.

We have, therefore, all been called by Jesus to follow Him.



What kinds of things may we need to "leave behind" in order to follow Jesus? Explain.



Read: Colossians 3:1-17; Ephesians 5:1-4



Can you give some practical examples in everyday life of some of the things mentioned in this passage that need to be left behind?



Can you give some practical examples in everyday life of some of the things mentioned in this passage that need to be done?

Following Jesus does not just mean adhering to a moral code or set of rules. Following Jesus is something that radically changes a person's life so that as they grow in their knowledge of God and relationship with Him, their lives reflect God's presence to those they meet.

Following Jesus means imitating Him. Being His disciple means learning to do the things Jesus did the way Jesus did them.

Everything Jesus did He did through the power of the Holy Spirit - that same Holy Spirit has been promised to Christians who ask God to be filled with Him.

Following Jesus means exchanging our way of life for God's way of doing life. It also means seeing ourselves the way God sees us.
